Voter Registration and Organ Donor Registration The LWVNYS has recently announced an innovative partnership with the New York Alliance for Donation (NYAD). NYAD's mission is to increase organ, eye and tissue donation in New York State to insure a transplant for every New Yorker in need. In 2009, NYS became the first state to include an organ and tissue donor enrollment section on voter registration forms. Since inception, over 160,00 individuals have enrolled in the donor registry via voter registration forms but this still only accounts for 15% of all enrollees. With this partnership, the hope is that we can increase both voter registrations and organ and tissue donor registrations together.

Jean McGarry participated in a training webinar on May 26 to learn more about increasing organ donation in New Your State through voter registration. As a result of partnering with the New York Alliance for Donation, our league will be eligible for a \$150 stipend to be used at our league's discretion. We will also be eligible to receive free or half-priced LWVNYS voter guides this fall which will include a special section on organ donation. Our goal is to expand our voter registration efforts while highlighting the urgent need for organ donation in New York State. We will kick off this campaign starting with National Voter Registration Day on Tuesday, September 22. Our success depends on our volunteers. Please answer the call.

June 16: <u>Undocumented: How Immigration Became Illegal</u>, Aviva Chomsky, 2014 Immigrant rights activist Aviva Chomsky shows how "illegality" and "undocumentedness" are concepts that were created to exclude and exploit. Blending history with human drama, Chomsky explores what it means to be undocumented in a legal, social, economic and historical context.

Chomsky is a professor of History and Latin American, Latino and Caribbean Studies at Salem State University and is the author of the 2007 book, "*They Take Our Jobs!"* and Other Myths About Immigration. This latest book explains why in spite of their critical value to the economy, so many potential workers have been declared illegal and are being turned away at the southern border.

Once illegal, workers who make it across the border are subject to discrimination, poor wages and work conditions, fraud, and even violent crimes - all things that they dare not report. And yet (the author argues), the concept of illegality is fairly new and is often based on prejudice and politics.
