for new programs and activities. Winter storm, Landon, left a thick layer of ice on our Ruby neighborhood, co-opting our power and internet for days and leaving a fallen forest on our lawn. I'd like to start with an apology to anyone who tried to join in on our Membership Meeting just after Landon. Internet was



restored, last of all, so the meeting never took place. Check the links for our next Program and Membership meetings. I have great confidence that we will hold them as planned. Please join us! Come and see what we're up to and add your ideas and/or talents to the pool.

That brings me to our next event, still virtual, on the Future of Solid Waste Management. Diversion, landfill siting and other solutions will be discussed. We have a panel of experts who will let us know how we will manage our solid waste, with the impending closure of the Seneca Meadows landfill. Seneca Meadows is where we have been sending our Ulster County trash for years and is a four-hour drive upstate for which our taxpayers have been footing the bill. New technologies, education and processes are no longer optional but are being actively pursued.

Other upcoming programs include a Members-Only Concurrence meeting to vote and express your thoughts on a triad of issues, Criminal Justice, Election Administration and Digital Equity. Details will be in our next newsletter.

This year's Legislative Agenda is hot off the presses! If you would like a copy, I'm happy to mail one out to you or find a printable version at Legislative Agenda 2022 LWV New York State (lwvny.org). They are handy resources for all the official LWVNY positions. As a local League, these positions are ours as well and this information can be used to enhance local lobbying efforts.

The next couple of weeks will be spent making appointments with and visiting our state representatives. Since the Mid-Hudson Region's geographic area spans so much territory, I am asking members join in our effort to reach out to each of our State Senators and Assembly members as League representatives. There are set questions to bring to interviews, along with plenty of instructions and support from experienced State and local Leaguers. We generally go in teams of two or three. If you are interested, please let us know! We can get together, via Zoom, and pair up with our neighbors to get this done - but the time to act is short. It is recommended the visits take place during the last two weeks of February, before legislative budget month in March. Send an email to the League's address, or call any board member to let us know you're interested. This is a simple, shortterm project where you can make all the difference and get to know your representatives at the same time. It's one of my favorite activities of the year.

Next up: Membership May is coming. Our board members are setting up small get-togethers in our different geographic areas in order to get to know our League's work and our nearby

members better. We had planned these twice before, but the pandemic got in the way. The third time's the charm!

Environmental Impact

Civilian Climate
Corps

"The Civilian
Climate Corps
(CCC) is an
executive
initiative put
forward by
President Biden in
his executive
order on climate
in January [2021].



The program is

organized through the Department of the Interior and Agriculture and aims to "conserve and restore public lands and waters, bolster community resilience, increase reforestation, increase carbon sequestration in the agricultural sector, protect biodiversity, improve access to recreation, and address the changing climate."

S.1057 - Civilian Climate Corps Act of 2021 117th Congress ...

During the New Deal's first winter, the nation's cities were filled with unemployed men desperate for work. In one of FDR's most popular initiatives, a Civilian Conservation Corps was created, initially employing 400,000 unemployed workers on projects designed to build and maintain America's parks. National Park Service's website. I first heard about the Civilian Conservation Corps listening to stories from my late father-in-law, a WW2 vet who spent a couple of memorable years in the program.

This is a unique opportunity for diverse young people to work together to make their world a better place. When it was first put forward as an executive order by President Biden it included no funding. There is a bill in the Senate first advanced by Senator Edward Markey of Massachusetts that would provide funding as part of the American Jobs Infrastructure Bill. There is discussion about breaking down the Jobs bill in order to pass parts of it through reconciliation, though the proposed funding is seen as meager for the scope of the program. The bill remains in the Senate.
