Impact your elected officials

Assembly Redistricting

Assembly maps, drafted by the Independent Redistricting Commission (IRC), were released on the 20th of April. The final maps


were voted on by the IRC and passed with a 9-1 vote. The maps will now go to the Legislature for a vote.

Laura Bierman, Executive Director of the League of Women Voters of New York State, responded to this news in a joint statement issued with the Executive Director of Common Cause and the Executive Director of the New York Public Interest Research Group (NYPIRG):

"The Assembly maps drawn by the Independent Redistricting

Commission are almost identical to the maps drawn by the Assembly already in place – showing that this whole process was a waste of New Yorkers time and money. New Yorkers deserve non-partisan maps not drawn by politicians who have their own stake in the outcome. We have long maintained that people, not politicians, should decide what the maps look like. If New York lawmakers want to respond to voters' desire that this chaos never happens again, they must advance an amendment that enshrines a truly independent redistricting process into the constitution."

On the positive side, many are happy that the process prevailed in keeping the Towns of Red Hook and Rhinebeck in AD 103, and the City of Poughkeepsie along with Beacon in AD 104.

LOCAL PRIMARIES COMING UP

Our three counties --Dutchess, Ulster and Orange -- are currently finalizing the petitions submitted by candidates running for office in their respective counties. It is anticipated that there will be primaries

Voting on primary candidates (i.e., where there are two or more candidates from the same party, running for the same office) will take place on June 27th. Early voting will take place June 17 to June 25th, on times and locations to be announced.

To vote in a primary, you must be registered by June 17th. If you need to file a Change of Address, that must be submitted by June

12th.

The counties will post on their websites information about the primaries as it becomes available. Our local League website gives contact information for the county websites.




LWVMHR President Speaks at Library










From UCRRA: We're Celebrating Compost Awareness Week!

As part of the ICAW committee's global discussion with our international partners around the world, we spoke the same language, and all wanted to promote a unified theme – aligning a topic important to each country while emphasizing our work with compost. The chosen 2023 theme best reflects the goal of focusing on how compost can have a role in helping feed the world, by making our soil healthier which produces healthier food. How does compost help? By recycling organics into compost and using it on our farmlands we create healthy soils that produce healthier food and higher yields. It also reduces the need for fertilizer and pesticides, improves water quality and conserves water, as well as stores carbon in soil – helping to reduce climate change. Compost not only helps the environment but also helps to decrease food shortages experienced around the world. For
