LWVMHR Book Club meetings north and south


Kick off the fall with a good book discussion! Meet other League members and share your thoughts on important subjects. We have a



Fun filled activity book (Grade 1-5) is available on the website, together with a website for students and teachers. Resources for

college students include a Best Practices guide for setting up Voter Registration drives.

State Statement In Response to Attorney
General James' Report on Governor
Cuomo

"We stand with the women who came forward to tell their story and commend them for their tremendous bravery. Attorney General James' office has completed a thorough, independent, and detailed investigation which they believe shows credible evidence that Governor Cuomo sexually harassed multiple staff members and members of the public. It is unconscionable that Governor Cuomo has made statements minimizing the experiences of his victims and sexual harassment survivors everywhere. This is unacceptable.

The League of Women Voters of New York State calls on the Legislature to carry out its constitutional responsibility and hold Governor Cuomo accountable for his actions."

Climate Smart Communities

There are numerous benefits to receiving Climate Smart designation for your town including a better, healthier life for citizens with improved water



and air quality, more places to walk and enjoy a more diverse and pleasing natural environment. Financial benefits include savings on utility bills and lower costs of damaging weather remediation, a more sustainable economic future through green businesses and practices as well as a more attractive environment for tourists and travelers. This is to name just a few.

Currently, there are 343 registered communities with 9,428,292 citizens living better lives, 63 of them Bronze Certified and 7 Silver Certified. To start the process to get your community on board, speak with your local government and ask them to pass a resolution to pledge their commitment to becoming a Registered Climate Smart Community. There are excellent resources to

assist concerned citizens in this process, followed by complete guidelines and information on how to proceed once the resolution is in place and a contact person is established.
