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Environmental Impact

What's happening at the former IBM Kingston site?

IBM Kingston began operations in 1955,



employing 5,000 and bringing an economic and social boon to Ulster County and beyond. They manufactured everything from typewriters to airline and space program support, as well as engineering processes, to advanced communication systems for finance, banking and retail stores. The gas panels created there paved the way for large screen HD televisions that was sold to Panasonic in 1997.

When they left in 1995, the community suffered great losses to business, employment and left a large and empty 28 building, 80acre property. The developer who took over failed to attract significant tenants and, in the process of cleaning out buildings, left huge piles of asbestos-laden waste on the site. Since this hazardous waste could not be disposed of easily or cheaply, the owner left the piles for years, further deteriorating the property and its value to others. The IBM corporation continues work to clean up the brownfield that exists under much of the property which left by disposal of chemical waste during manufacturing in the early years.

Finally, in 2019, Ulster County foreclosed on 18 parcels of the property for non-payment of taxes. In came National Resources, a company that had successfully taken over an IBM facility in Dutchess County, creating a thriving business park. The Kingston project is called iPark 87 and will fill the spaces with targeted industries in logistics and manufacturing; film and media; food and beverage; health and wellness as well as education.

Here's where my story really begins. On August 12th, I attended an event at iPark 87 where Senator Schumer introduced the newest tenant- Zinc8- a leader in Zinc Air Battery Technology. According to their website this is "an innovative battery technology that uses Zinc and air as fuel. The technology resolves the intermittent and unpredictable nature of renewable energy sources such as wind and solar" and is a cost-effective solution to effective energy storage. The company will create up to 500 well-paying manufacturing jobs and start the former IBM site on the way toward a better future for the community and a sustainable future for all. There are already contracts for renewable energy projects in New York State, with a great deal of interest expressed by others.

Senator Schumer and Zinc8 CEO Ron MacDonald spoke at length about plans for the site, joined by County Executive Pat Ryan, as well as a number of other excellent speakers. Ashley Dittus, representing the UC Board of Elections, presented Senator Schumer with swag created by a youth voting sticker design contest winner - Hudson Rowan of Stone Ridge. His design went viral online and garnered more than 200,000 votes! This "I Voted" Sticker Has 6 Legs, 2 Eyes and was even noted in the New York Times.

I was fortunate to have been invited to the event as a member of Town of Ulster Citizens, headed by Laura Hartmann, a community mover and shaker with her own plans for arts and music at the site.

Lisa Garcia, EPA regional administrator, also spoke and pointed out that this project finally has the resources to complete the cleanup, thanks to Senator Schumer's support for New York on a federal level. She stated that cleanup would begin on Monday August 15th (the event was Friday).

iPark owner National Resources CEO Joe Cotter has promised to invest \$200m over ten years in what he described as the "ugliest challenge my company had ever taken on." Future power -Hudson Valley One

This is truly a collaborative effort among leadership at all levels and support of citizens. I am excited to see what's next!
