SOME NOTES FROM THE STATE LEAGUE CONVENTION (June 20 - 22)

Four LWVMHR members attended this event in Albany: Dare Thompson, Leslie Simons, Cindy Bell, and brand new member Deborah McManus.

The newest president of LWVUS, Dianna Wynn, was with us for a full day and among the most interesting things she talked about was how and why LWVUS decided to declare that the U.S. is in a constitutional crisis. Dianna was open and accessible - "Hey, remember, I'm a local League member like you!" she said. She's from Cary, North Carolina (near Durham) and is a communication consultant with several books on that topic to her credit.

Another speaker was Olivia Hill, a transgender woman who has managed to get elected to the Nashville, TN city council as a Member At-Large. That victory against a background of so much hate and misinformation even in a blue city was inspiring to all of us and we gave her a huge standing ovation. Two things from her talk that will forever stick with me are 1) even she was surprised by the significant changes she experienced when she lost "white male privilege" and 2) becoming a female changed her body AND MIND in ways she totally didn't expect - e.g. lost upper body strength and gained a confusing new ability to multi-task! I think we are now all more prepared and enthusiastic about supporting former males in female sports and wherever people say a trans woman doesn't belong. Go to https://theoliviahill.com/ for more. MEMBERSHIPS:

Every year we also look at our membership numbers as of January 31 of the current year. We saw that in the state as a whole the membership grew by about 10%, thanks not only to the hard work of League members but also to the political climate.

And what local League now has the most members? You might think NYC but no - it's in second place. Number 1 is Saratoga County! It has 287 to NYC's 219! With 168 members we are in 5th place, after Albany County with 195 members and Rochester Metro with 182. All of us are clearly doing good work but where Saratoga really stands out is with the fun they have. Let's remember that in all *we* do. Joy is not only important in keeping us going - it makes us better!

LEARNING FROM ONE ANOTHER:

The speakers are great, but the main reason we go to Convention is to learn from one another. On the last morning, all the presidents met in a separate room for breakfast and to talk with our executive director, Erica Smitka, and president, Nancy Rosenthal. Many of us continue to learn from one another throughout the year but not in person in one room! Go team!

We also discussed where to bring certain materials and where County residents waste is processed. This included refusing, reusing, repairing, rethinking, reeducating, recycling, and composting practices.

Legislation

Voter Registration Challenges

As of now, the Federal SAVE Act (Safeguard American Voter Eligibility), promising tectonic shifts in who, how, and when people may register to vote, is winding its way through the U.S. Senate. Its passage and implementation – whether all or in part – will affect our League's core mission of registering voters. At the sametime, our identity is being challenged from another front – New York State is considering automatic voter registration for all eligible voters. The passage of either, or both, will surely change what we do and how we do it.

While we understand the purpose of the SAVE Act is to restrict voting rights, and the purpose of New York's move to automatic registration is to expand those rights, the implication for our work is the same – how do we shift from registering voters to educating and giving them the tools they need to make the best choices for them and their families? This is something the League will need to address in this changing environment.

For over a century, the League has put voter services – registration, education, and voting information – at the core of its mission. It's incumbent on the League to not only fight against the passage and implementation of the SAVE Act, but also to think strategically about how we continue to serve the voting public if registering voters is off the table. How do we support voters and voting rights, help people navigate the revised registration process, and ensure that people have access to nonpartisan, fact-based voting information? That discussion needs to start now.

NY MAID Act

The New York Medical Aid in Dying (MAID) Act has finally passed in the NYS Senate! It passed in the Assembly earlier this year, so now it will go to

the Governor for her to sign. This bill would afford terminally ill New Yorkers greater peace and the ability to die with dignity.


The MAID Act would allow a terminally ill, mentally capable adult to request life-ending medication from a doctor that the person can self-administer at a time of his or her choosing, or never, should suffering become unbearable.

NY ERIC Bill

The ERIC bill has finally passed in the NYS Assembly!

The Electronic Registration Information Center (ERIC) is a nonprofit, nonpartisan membership organization created by and comprised of state election officials from around the U.S. It's the most effective tool available to help election officials maintain more accurate voter rolls. It passed in the NYS Senate earlier this year so now it will go to the Governor for her to sign. This bill will allow NY to join a multistate voter list maintenance organization like ERIC. LWVMHR Observer Jane Simkin Smith writes:

"A **Mother's Out Front** member brought attention to the Dutchess County Resource and Recovery Agency's Put or Pay Solid Waste Disposal Service Agreement which, she urged, was not favorable to taxpayers; she also inveighed against the amount of waste being sent to incinerators and landfills, and urged county wide composting along with the need to know the economic impact of a new boiler or super incinerator".
